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LC CAIRO OFFICE FY 2009 – EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Collection development activities – Highlights

Cairo office continued to use an extensive network of bibliographic representatives and vendors blended with acquisitions travel and a robust exchange program to meet its goals.

- Acquisitions travel – Office staff members made several important trips outside of Egypt to the region, including Algeria, Oman and Tunisia for book fairs, and Bahrain, Libya and Yemen as regular acquisition trips. The most important trips were to Bahrain where the Office has hired a new vendor and Algeria where there was an inactive vendor. In all cases, these trips are important as publications outside any given country's borders are not readily available. These trips yielded 940 new monograph titles acquired for LC alone.
- Cairo Book Fair – Cairo resumed its partnership with Leila Books to provide comprehensive coverage of this large fair. We also surveyed the coverage offered by Leila Books, specifically for Egyptian publications, and found that their performance improved significantly over last year. With staff working long hours to get materials processed and shipped out in a timely fashion, the office was able to achieve its goals. 1,009 new titles were acquired for LC and MECAP participants, 544 Egyptian overdue titles for MECAP participants, and 115 lists were circularized.
- Exchange and gift program – An influx of materials acquired by gift and exchange rose this year, reaching 6,587 pieces compared to 3,126 last year. There was a wide distribution of the exchange lists in Arabic and English to exchange partners in Egypt and the Middle East. The section sent exchange materials to Arab countries such as Sudan, Tunisia, and Libya. Total number of pieces sent was 1,556. Of special significance is a shipment of gift pieces sent by the office to Salah al-Din Provincial Reconstruction Team in Iraq, a total of 341 pieces to be used towards a new library being constructed in that province. Twelve new exchange partners were contacted and 15 local and international conferences were covered by the office in FY09.

Acquisitions and Cataloging Section – Highlights

- The Section acquired 7,917 monographic titles and 338 pieces in other formats for LC. There was a significant increase in the number of titles acquired Iraq, Lebanon, West Bank and Saudi Arabia.
- In the area of Cataloging, 7,789 cataloging records were created, compared with 5,687 records during the previous year. Among the key areas of production include 1,568 full monograph records, 1,009 whole book records, 907 MLC, 211 added volumes, 542 monograph fiche, 187 non-print, and 168 maps. Name authority records created by Cairo staff totaled 1,814, with 384 more updated or corrected.

- In the last quarter of FY09 the Office began a new system for sending and receiving feedback for cataloging review from Washington. This was coupled with a new system for handling copycat records. These new procedures will have an impact on reducing the backlog the office faces over the next FY.

Serials, Binding and Shipping – Highlights

- As of the end of FY09, the section maintained subscriptions to 3,084 newspaper and serial titles on LC's behalf, receiving 47,417 issues on a commercial basis. An additional 3,198 issues were received either as gifts or on exchange. 31,231 issues were received for MECAP participants.
- For technical processing, serials staff created 427 new serial catalog records. An additional 65 other records were modified to reflect changes required to link to newly-created records. 146 new NAF records were created.
- A total of 12,338 volumes were bound, of which slightly less than half, or 6,141 volumes, were for the Library of Congress' collections.
- 2,180 holdings record transactions were made for Law Library materials and 858 for Self Contained Units in Western languages.
- The section shipped 2,173 boxes and 174 envelopes of materials to LC and MECAP participants.
- A special highlight in serials backlog processing: with the help of our Kurdish specialist, the Office was able to catalog about 130 Kurdish serial titles and make them ready for shipping to AMED. In addition, the Office collated and sent about 53 serial titles to New Delhi office for microfilming. It also processed around 80 per cent of our backlog of newspapers waiting to be collated and sent them to New Delhi for microfilming.

Information Technology and Automation – Highlights

- Developments in FY09 saw the upgrade of the LAN from 100Mbps to 1000Mbps by installing and configuring new 1Gbps switches.
- The office's IT staff installed new backup server with a 160GB removable backup storage cartridge.
- Staff installed new Pamphlet Collection System (PCS). The new software is a web application running under IIS and SQL server database. Three staff have been trained on how to use the new software.
- The Office developed the tables for and tested the new ILS Transliterator tool for Arabic. Similar tables tools for Urdu and Persian reverse transliteration first

developed here in Cairo were recently distributed to other field offices at the end of FY09.

- The office also participated in an important pilot test of remote access to electronic resources in using Firepass. The test measured the ability of the office to access remote databases and e-resources otherwise accessible only on-site in Washington.

Personnel, Administrative and Financial

- The office's new permanent field director, Mr. William J. Kopycki, arrived to post in April 2009 after completing security clearances and other preliminaries. He replaced interim field director Mr. Michael Neubert, who enjoyed a successful period of 10 months ending in November 2008.
- The office welcomed Mr. Islam Moussa Kheidr who joined the office in December 2008 as the Binding Serials Receiving clerk. He replaced Mr. Hany Kabesh's position where Hany now is the Binding/Collating Technician.
- There were several positions CAJE'd: in the Acquisitions & Cataloging Section, Mr. Khaled Reyad was promoted from LES-7 Librarian to LES-8 Librarian (Assistant Section Head). Ms. Magda Fathy was promoted from LES-7 to LES-8 (Quality Assurance Cataloger). Mr. Yasser Hussein, Ms. Mona Abdel Kader, and Mr. Mahmoud Khalifa, all in the Cataloging section, were promoted from LES-7 to LES-8.
- In spite of the progress in FY2008 for the Office to negotiate an additional 72 meters of much-needed space, the Management section of the Embassy denied the request. As such, the Office has had to work harder to come up with creative solutions to maximize its existing limited space.

Middle East Cooperative Acquisitions Program (MECAP) – Highlights

- The office acquired 10,008 monographs and non-book materials, along with 31,231 serial pieces, for MECAP participants. The Acquisitions Section circularized 1,009 lists to participants, including 14 for Kurdish titles, 21 for Armenian titles, and 148 for Turkish titles.
- The resulting firm order and profile selections, along with subscriptions, translated into 1,093 boxes along with 124 envelopes being shipped to Participants.

Outreach – Highlights

- The Field Director gave three presentations to public audiences and special groups:
 - “World Digital Library”, Cairo University Central Library, May 2009.
 - “Cataloging in a shared bibliographic environment”, al-Minufiyah University, Library and Information Science Department, Kafr al-Shaykh, Egypt, June 2009.
 - Overview of Library of Congress, Cairo Office activities; US Embassy, IRC. Presented to a group of visiting Egyptian public librarians; June 2009.
- During President Obama’s visit to Cairo, the exchange librarian Ms. Maha Alfred collected all significant articles written before and after the visit from the daily, weekly newspapers and magazines in Egypt and made a complete file with important photos to document the whole visit.
- In April-May 2009, the Office’s head of automation Mr. Amr Hamza accompanied Nairobi Field Director Ms. Pamela Howard-Reguindin to Monrovia, Liberia, as part of a House Democracy Assistance Commission (HDAC) project. There, they conducted an initial assessment of the Liberian Legislative Library, Archives and Research services.
- Mr. Mahmoud Khalifa, from the Cataloging section, traveled to Oman in October 2008 to deliver a workshop about "Library service in digital age: Web 2.0 and Library 2.0". It was organized by Omani Library Association and 55 trainees attended the workshop.
- The Cairo Office continued providing invaluable support for the relationship between the National Library of Egypt and the Library of Congress (NLAE). Cairo Office has served as liaison for NLAE and a local company responsible for maintenance of the digitizing equipment NLAE uses to participate in World Digital Library.

ADMINISTRATIVE, FINANCIAL AND PERSONNEL

Budget and Finance

In FY2009, after some reductions at the beginning of the year, the Office was given a budget of \$1,313,282 for personnel and non-personnel operating expenses. Cumulative obligations amounted to \$1,074,952.33, out of which \$1,019,219.51 was liquidated by the end of the fiscal year.

The total budget for the Middle East Cooperative Acquisitions Program (MECAP) was \$910,965.03. The total budget of GENPAC and Law was \$110,000. Total acquisitions for LC, however, were \$127,231.85 due to a number of acquisition trips, a successful Cairo book fair, and frequent Turkish and Iraqi shipments during the year.

Other Financial Achievements

- The Accounting Section was able to enter 17,435 monograph records and 4,312 serial records in the IODA accounting system.
- The Receiving Section received 106 shipments from different vendors from the Middle East and Turkey. This resulted in the process of 1187 invoices entered in IODA, with a total of 112 vouchers processed for these vendors.
- General Service Office in the Embassy had announced in November 2008 the implementation of the E2 Travel System. This system will replace the Travel Authorization Form the Office used to prepare for travelers. Training sessions were provided for the arranger, who will enter the ticket reservation, lodging, and per diem. Other sessions were provided for travelers and the approver.
- This year with the help of our new Field Director, William Kopycki, the Office was able to successfully send annual MECAP participant invoices electronically which saved a lot of time, paperwork, and review.

Personnel – New Field Director

The office's new permanent field director, Mr. William J. Kopycki, arrived to post in April 2009 after completing security clearances and other preliminaries. He replaced interim field director Mr. Michael Neubert, who enjoyed a successful period of 10 months ending in November 2008. For the period of time between Mr. Neubert's departure and Mr. Kopycki's arrival in April, Ms. Rabab Mohi El-Din was Officer-in-Charge.

Personnel – New Hires

The office welcomed Mr. Islam Moussa Kheidr who joined the office in December 2008 as the Binding Serials Receiving Clerk.

Personnel – Reassignments

Mr. Hany Kabesh was redeployed from his position of Binding Serials Receiving Clerk to assume the duties of Binding/Collating Technician.

Personnel –Computer Assisted Job Evaluation (CAJE) for Locally Employed Staff

Interim Field Director Neubert worked through the Embassy’s HR system to enable staff to CAJE, and thus reclassified their positions. There were several positions CAJE’d: in the Acquisitions & Cataloging Section: Mr. Khaled Reyad was promoted from LES-7 Librarian to LES-8 Librarian (Assistant Section Head). Ms. Magda Fathy was promoted from LES-7 to LES-8 (Quality Assurance Cataloger). Mr. Yasser Hussein, Ms. Mona Abdel Kader, and Mr. Mahmoud Khalifa, all in the Cataloging Section, were promoted from LES-7 to LES-8.

Training

Administrative Assistant and Cashier Ms. Hanaa Hassan successfully completed the “Advanced Cashiering Workshop”, held from July 27-31, 2009 at RM/GFS Charleston, South Carolina.

Head of Serials, Binding and Shipping Mr. Ahmed Moustafa successfully completed a course on “Coaching and Counseling for Outstanding Job Performance” from September 9-10, offered by the American University in Cairo to Embassy staff.

Annual Salary Increase

Embassy Management had announced a salary increase of 3.9 percent effective May 10, 2009 after performing several salary surveys in the Egyptian labor market.

Office Space

In spite of the progress in FY08 for the Office to negotiate an additional 72 meters of much-needed space, the Management section of the Embassy denied the request. As such, the Office has had to work harder to come up with creative solutions to maximize its existing limited space. Changing procedures in Copycat has started to show an increase of materials being shipped out of the office, while re-arrangement of shelving units in the Cataloging section has also added some efficiency.

During the course of the year, Embassy Management staff made visits to the Office to inspect safety and other facilities-related issues. Some problems related to air-conditioning were resolved in the Cataloging Section, while those in the Serials and Shipping section remain to be completed. Renovation of the Embassy’s courtyard had a negative impact on the work environment, particularly in the Serials section. The Office is working with Embassy facilities to resolve remaining safety issues.

THE MIDDLE EAST COOPERATIVE ACQUISITIONS PROGRAM (MECAP)

FY09 ended with 42 participants in the MECAP program—no new participants, but no withdrawals. Some participants modified their profiles in light of the current economic situation. Third quarter and FY10 invoices were sent electronically this year to participants; this resulted in Washington receiving several payments ahead of schedule.

The Office acquired 10,008 monographs and non-book materials, along with 31,231 serial pieces, for MECAP participants. The Acquisitions Section circularized 1,009 lists to participants, including 14 for Kurdish titles, 21 for Armenian titles, and 148 for Turkish titles. The resulting firm order and profile selections, along with subscriptions, translated into 1,093 boxes along with 124 envelopes being shipped to participants; of these numbers, 6,197 volumes were bound for participants.

ACQUISITIONS AND CATALOGING SECTION

Overview

FY09 showed an increase of all section activities. There was an increase in the number of titles acquired for LC and MECAP participants. The section purchased 7,917 monographic titles and 338 pieces in other formats were for LC. There was a significant increase in the number of titles acquired from Iraq, Lebanon, West Bank and Saudi Arabia.

In the area of Cataloging, 7,789 cataloging records were created, compared with 5,687 records during the previous year. Among the key areas of production include 1,568 full monograph records, 1,009 whole book records, 907 MLC, 211 added volumes, 542 monograph fiche, 187 non-print, and 168 maps. Name authority records created by Cairo staff totaled 1,814, and 384 updated or corrected.

Acquisitions travel

Office staff members made several important trips outside of Egypt to the region, including Algeria, Oman and Tunisia for book fairs, and Bahrain, Libya and Yemen as regular acquisition trips. The most important trips were to Bahrain where the Office hired a new vendor and Algeria where there was an inactive vendor. In all cases, these trips are important as publications outside any given country's borders are not readily available. These trips yielded 940 new monograph titles acquired for LC alone.

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Book Fairs Covered by the Acquisitions and Cataloging Section

Four book fairs were covered during FY09

- Algeria Int. Book Fair.
- Oman International Book Fair.
- Tunisia International Book Fair
- Cairo International Book Fair.

The premiere event of the book fair season continues to be the Cairo International Book Fair. The 41st Cairo International Book Fair started on January 21st and ended February 5th, 2009. Cairo resumed its partnership with Leila Books to provide comprehensive coverage of this large fair. More than 27 countries participated, with books from over 765 Arab and foreign publishing houses represented. The United Kingdom was the guest honor of this year. The political situation in Gaza somewhat affected this year's event, although three exhibitors from West Bank, Gaza and Jerusalem were present. There were no publishers from Oman, Bahrain, and Qatar this year, and in fact, the few Qatari titles on display were exhibited by an Egyptian publisher. Most of Arab exhibitors were from Jordan, Syria, Lebanon and Saudi Arabia. From North Africa there were three publishers from Morocco, two from Tunisia, one from Algeria, and three from Libya. As for non-book materials, there were many exhibitors for CDs, DVDs, and computer files. The bulk of these materials (est. 80%) were religious/devotional in nature, and songs. There was one source for cartographic materials, the Egyptian Survey Authority.

The section surveyed the coverage offered by Leila Books, specifically for Egyptian publications, and found that their performance improved significantly over last year.

With staff working long hours to get materials processed and shipped out in a timely fashion, the Office was able to achieve its goals. 1,009 new titles were acquired for LC and MECAP participants, 544 Egyptian overdue titles for MECAP participants, and 115 lists were circularized.

MECAP program activities

IN FY09, the Section circulated 1,009 lists of 9,383 titles to participants. The following table shows the number of list thus circulated, according the country of publication, number of lists, and number of titles.

The MECAP Order Manipulation System (MOMS) continues to be used by participants. A total of 11,169 monographs were selected by 15 participants using MOMS. Five of these 15 participants selected 8,118 of these 11,169 monographs – in short, one-third of the participants using the system selected three-quarters of the monographs supplied through it.

Work is presently being developed to have MOMS display Arabic script in the lists distributed to participants.

Exchange and Gift Program

An influx of materials acquired by gift and exchange nearly doubled this year, reaching 6,587 pieces compared to 3,126 last year. There was a wide distribution of the exchange lists in Arabic and English to partners in Egypt and the Middle East. The Section sent exchange materials to Arab countries such as Sudan, Tunisia, and Libya. Total number of pieces sent was 1,556.

Of special significance is a shipment of gift pieces sent by the office to Salah al-Din Provincial Reconstruction Team in Iraq, a total of 341 pieces, to be used towards a new library being constructed in that province.

Twelve new exchange partners were contacted and 15 local and international conferences were covered by the office in FY09.

Acquisitions by Bibliographic Representatives

The Office's bibliographic representative in Sudan was very active, acquiring several conference proceedings, reports and pamphlets, in addition to visiting many NGOs and international organizations' offices. In spite of the prevailing circumstances, the Office's representative in the West Bank has managed to send many new titles. The representative in Saudi Arabia collects a great number of materials, though there have been delays in shipments. In Lebanon, the Office's bibliographic representative has been very active in supplying non-commercial serials and election materials. The Office's representative in Syria has made good improvement though there are some difficulties in acquiring from governmental institutions.

Cataloging activities

In the area of cataloging, 7,789 cataloging records were created, compared with 5,687 records during the previous year. Among the key areas of production include 1,568 full monograph records, 1,009 whole book records, 907 MLC, 211 added volumes, 542 monograph fiche, 187 non-print, and 168 maps. Name authority records created by the Section staff totaled 1,814, and 384 updated or corrected.

A significant technical upgrade having an immediate impact on many staff was the development and testing of the new ILS Transliterator tool for Arabic. During July and August the field director developed rules and tables for transforming Arabic, Persian and Urdu romanized forms into Arabic script. Office staff participated in full testing and feedback. The end result was a true "reverse" Transliterator tool, similar to that of OCLC's Connexion client, which saves the Arabic catalogers a great amount of time in inputting Arabic script fields into MARC records via the ILS.

A new system has been implemented in the last quarter of FY09 for dealing with Copycat records. These new procedures will have an impact on reducing the backlog the Office faces

over FY10. Furthermore, the Cataloging Section began a new system for sending and receiving feedback for cataloging review from Washington. The Office focuses its whole-book cataloging for subject classes B, P and D, with the aim of individual staff gaining independence in these classes. Review presently covers Arabic and Turkish language materials. As for those in Kurdish and Armenian, staff will continue to produce initial bibliographic records for materials in these languages for the time being.

SERIALS, BINDING AND SHIPPING SECTION

Library of Congress Serials Activity

This year, the Office subscribed to 3,084 active commercial serial titles and newspapers, on behalf of LC. The Office received 47,417 issues for LC, including 2,815 issues on exchange basis and 383 issues as gifts.

New Serial Titles for LC

During the fiscal year the Section received 346 new serial titles through commercial, exchange and gift channels for LC.

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This year serial librarians created 427 bibliographic records online in OCLC for new serial titles and modified 65 bibliographic records.

Serials acquisition trip: Cairo Book Fair

During the Cairo Book Fair, Serials staff acquired 420 serial issues of 81 titles from various countries (vendors had been unable to supply the missing issues in spite of repeated claims on behalf of participants as well as LC). Staff also identified 27 new serial titles.

Serials acquisition trip: United Arab Emirates

The Section acquired continuations, missing issues and back issues (about 526 issues and volumes) from 61 serial titles published by 26 different publishers and institutions, including those in Abu Dhabi, Dubai, Sharjah and Ajman, for LC and MECAP participants. From this, 22 new serial titles were acquired.

Serials acquisition trip: Tunisia

The Office acquired continuations, missing issues and back issues (about 827 issues and volumes) from 69 serial titles published by 41 different publishers and institutions for LC and MECAP participants. In addition, staff were able to check the status and availability of about 18 serial titles.

LC-Cairo Serials Database

The Cairo serials database carries a total of 4,194 active serial and newspaper titles. Of this, LC-Cairo receives 3,286 serial titles on commercial basis for LC and/or at least one of the thirty-four MECAP participants in LC-Cairo's serials program. The Office received an additional 908 serial titles on exchange and gift basis.

An "active" title is one for which issues have been received during the past five years.

This year, serials librarians created 146 new NAF authority records and also modified 57 authority records.

This year, with the help of the Office's Kurdish specialist, 130 Kurdish serial titles were completed and prepared for shipping to AMED.

Checking in Serials Online in Voyager

This year the Office checked in Voyager about 3,038 issues and SCU volumes of which were 2,180 Law serial issues and volumes, and 858 roman-script language volumes.

MECAP Participants Activity

This year the office received 31,231 pieces. Subscriptions for calendar year 2009 were placed on behalf of thirty-four MECAP participants.

The Serials Unit continued to provide service to MECAP participants. Staff responded in a timely manner to claims for missing issues, informed participants about the changes in titles and publishers. In addition to sending each participant lists of ceased or suspended serial

titles they also created lists of “Special Notes” pertaining to titles for each participant’s subscription list. All itemized lists were mailed with the participant’s FY09 estimated bill.

Shipping Activities

This year the Shipping Unit shipped a total of 2,173 boxes and 174 envelopes.

The Unit shipped 454 boxes of serials, 397 boxes of bound monographs, videocassettes, audiocassettes and CD-ROMs to various decisions in LC. 215 boxes of materials were sent to New Delhi for microfilming or microfiching.

The Unit also shipped 14 boxes of exchange materials to partners in the region; to vendors and bibliographic representatives the Unit shipped 50 envelopes of purchase order forms, checks and correspondences.

For MECAP participants the Unit shipped 592 boxes of unbound and bound serials, 501 boxes of monographs, and 124 envelopes.

This year the Unit reviewed and updated all LC shipping addresses to reflect the change in the ABA divisions and sections.

Preservation – Binding Activities

The Section was able to bind 12,338 volumes for LC and MECAP participants.

All serials for LC are retained until bound in Cairo. All new serials are retained until the title has received full level cataloging on LC's databases. A printout of the bibliographic record is inserted in every volume shipped to LC to facilitate front end processing in LC by staff without knowledge of Arabic.

Three participants have the Office retain serials for binding. Twenty participants have monographs bound in Cairo.

Preservation - Microfilm

This year the Section was able to create GTC (Guide to Contents) for about 53 newspaper and serial titles and send them to New Delhi office for microfilming. In addition, the Section was able to process about 80% of the backlog of newspapers waiting to be collated and sent to New Delhi for microfilming.

This year the Section has processed a shipment of 46 Serial titles to be microfiched in New Delhi.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY AND AUTOMATION

The Office manages and maintains its own LAN with 60 nodes and 10 servers. Developments in FY09 saw the upgrade of the LAN from 100Mbps to 1000Mbps by installing and configuring new 1Gbps switches. The Office's IT staff installed new backup server with a 160GB removable backup storage cartridge.

Staff worked to improve functionality of, or at least obtain maximum results from, the Office's legacy software. The AOS program modules are being developed to include new versions of reports, an invoices demo module, binding module and shipping module. Procedures for converting IODA report data into MS Excel format for electronic invoicing and delivery have been nearly perfected.

Staff installed new Pamphlet Collection System (PCS) acquired by the field director during a visit to the New Delhi Office which created it. The new software is a web application running under IIS and SQL server database. The installation included creating of new internal website and installation of its SQL database on Cairo SQL server. Three staff members have been trained in using the software.

By far the most important technical upgrade having an immediate impact on many staff was development and testing of the new ILS Transliterator tool for Arabic. During July and August the field director developed rules and tables for transforming Arabic, Persian and Urdu Romanized forms into Arabic script. Office staff participated in full testing and feedback. The end result was a true "reverse" Transliterator tool which saves the Arabic catalogers a great amount of time in inputting Arabic script fields into MARC records via the ILS. The tools for Urdu and Persian reverse transliteration first developed here in Cairo were recently distributed to other field offices at the end of FY09.

The IT staff also worked closely with Washington OVOP Senior automation specialist Mr. Tony Pierce in testing software, connections and firewall access. The Office also participated in an important pilot test of remote access to electronic resources in using Firepass. The test measured the ability of the office to access remote databases and e-resources otherwise accessible only on-site in Washington. Office staff provided Washington with feedback and testimony as to the usefulness of the service and its technical aspects.

OUTREACH AND OTHER ACTIVITIES

Presentations by the field director

The Field Director was invited to give three presentations to public audiences and special groups:

- Overview of Library of Congress, Cairo Office activities; US Embassy, IRC. Presented to a group of visiting Egyptian public librarians; April 30, 2009.
- "World Digital Library", Cairo University Central Library, May 3, 2009.
- "Cataloging in a shared bibliographic environment", al-Minufiyah Univeristy, Library and Information Science Department, Kafr al-Shaykh, Egypt, June 9, 2009.

These sessions were well-attended (the World Digital Library presentation had over 100 in attendance), and reflected the local community's interest in Library of Congress' activities in general, and that of Cairo Office in particular. The presentation at al-Minufiyah University was an opportunity to speak to a more provincial audience of librarians in a rural city.

The Egyptian Library Association gave special recognition to the field director during its annual meeting in North Sinai, July 2009, presenting him with a commemorative plaque and

certificate. The Field Director was unable to attend the conference due to the security situation, but expressed his appreciation to the association for their gesture.

Press reports for CRS and AMED

The exchange librarian succeeded in contacting the Public Affairs Office in Iraq, Syria, and Yemen to receive the press summary on daily basis. The press summary is sent to Congressional Research Service and AMED staff daily.

POTUS visit to Cairo

During President Obama's visit to Cairo, the exchange librarian, Ms. Maha Alfred, collected all significant articles written before and after the visit from the daily, weekly newspapers and magazines in Egypt and made a complete file with important photos to document the whole visit.

Administrative assistant Ms. Hanaa Hassan worked with other Embassy staff to prepare Cairo University for the President's speech and bring VIP's inside. Following his speech, the President met with Embassy staff at a special staff-only event at the Pyramids. Despite enduring three hours in the scorching heat waiting for his arrival, many Office staff attended this special event.

HDAC Staff Assessment, Monrovia, Liberia

In April-May 2009, the Office's Head of Automation Mr. Amr Hamza accompanied Nairobi Field Director Ms. Pamela Howard-Reguindin to Monrovia, Liberia, as part of a House Democracy Assistance Commission (HDAC) project. There, they conducted an initial assessment of the Liberian Legislative Library, Archives and Research services.

They made assessments in the areas of physical plant needs, furniture, IT hardware and software needs, staffing configurations and training needs. Meetings were held with both Liberian and US officials to keep all concerned in the loop.

Staff presentation in Oman

Mr. Mahmoud Khalifa, from the Cataloging section, traveled to Oman in October 2008 to deliver a workshop about "Library service in digital age: Web 2.0 and Library 2.0". It was organized by Omani Library Association and 55 trainees attended the workshop.

National Library and Archives of Egypt (NLAE) liaison activities

The Cairo Office continued providing invaluable support for the relationship between the NLAE and the Library of Congress. In January 2009, Ms. Hanaa Hassan made local arrangements for John Van Oudenaren from LC-Washington and international delegates to visit Cairo to hold the World Digital Library Content Selection Group Meeting. Cairo Office has served as liaison between LC-Washington and a local company responsible for maintenance of the digitizing equipment NLAE uses to participate in World Digital Library.

LOOKING AHEAD

Full staffing

With a new permanent field director, the Office spent the third and last quarters of the FY interviewing a cataloging librarian to create IBC records. This person has been hired and is expected to start soon. This will make the total office staff 34.

Cataloging independence

One of the long-term goals of the office is to provide “shelf-ready” cataloging for materials sent to Washington. This starts with first ensuring that Cairo catalogers can work independently to provide full-level of cataloging for subject materials with minimal review. The Office now works under a new review and shipping matrix to enable materials under review to be received by ASME staff and returned in a timely fashion.

Maximizing resources

In light of tighter budgets and allocations and even space limitations, the Office will review its operating procedures and policies to ensure that key areas such as acquisition travel and technical processing are being fully maximized from resources allocated. This means trying new models and methods.

Outreach

The Office will work to engage with other agencies and local communities, including libraries, publishers, NGOs and cultural institutions, both in Egypt and in the greater region, to foster goodwill and accentuate its goals.
